A Special Announcement

The following was sent out on the BARS email reflector, but I think it deserves repeating here. – ed.

Hello everyone.

As you know, Governor Baker's response to the COVID-19 crisis has forced us to cancel our April meeting. I have also heard from Gary, W1GFF, that the Chelmsford Bible Church is closed until further notice as well. This means that VE sessions for BARS are also cancelled.

I will update the Club as to whether we can have our May meeting. The situation is fluid, as they say. Likewise for VE session status if you have questions please direct them to Gary Frascarelli W1GFF and Bruce Anderson W1LUS.

I have observed other clubs such as NVARC in Pepperell trying to go-live with virtual meetings and reviving VHF nets to keep members connected. I applaud this and will be the first to tell you if BARS begins doing virtual meetings. Meanwhile, stay connected by getting on the air, getting on our Net, and of course feel free to post to the BARS email list which is there for all members' use.

Another thing that is in flux is the W1DC repeater. I have told you that BARS is not the owner of W1DC but we are a user of course. This repeater is owned by the 1200 Radio Club and the location of the repeater is the former Honeywell building on Concord Road in Billerica. Mike Rioux, W1USN, has been working on upgrading the old repeater and has enlisted Doug Elfman, N1LHP, to test the new equipment and configure it.

I was not notified or involved in recent testing but from what I have observed, the new repeater is now being used simultaneously on 147.12, with a different PL tone. It appears Doug has done this to allow the new repeater to exercise itself and be checked out before installing permanently at Concord Road.

There has been a huge amount of chatter on both repeaters, and people are speculating what will happen next. People are offering to take up a collection for a better antenna, etc. Some people have also wondered why BARS has not made some sort of announcement - well, it's not *our* repeater. The 1200 Radio Club owns and operates it, and maintains a budget for it. If you hear questions on the repeater, please feel free to tell people this news and that the 1200 Radio Club is the organization doing the upgrade.

Please be patient and when the 1200 Radio Club finishes the work I am sure word will get out.

This work may affect our Wednesday 8PM BARS Net. My suggestion is to continue to use the 103.5 PL for the old repeater for all BARS traffic.

I hope all our members are doing well.

If you approached the drooling, long haired rockstar — you win! The man is Greg Ginn, guitarist for the punk band Black Flag.


I have found very little info on Greg's ham hobby but it started in the 1970s, apparently. Greg was WB6ZNM, and active in California. He was so enthusiastic that he actually founded The Novice newsletter. His aims were very ambitious – check out this vintage ad from 73. Has anyone ever seen The Novice?

There is a newsletter being put out M just for Novices and beginners. Appropriately named THE NOVICE, it is put out by Greg Ginn (WB6ZNM) and appears monthly with news of Novice O traffic handling, Novice nets, FCC actions as related to the Notice, contests, awards, letters, product reviews, and dozens of simple but handy construction projects. It is a big job that Ta 4 Greg is trying to do in putting out THE NOVICE and he would like to get more Novices involved in both reading and writing for THE NOVICE. More interestingly, Greg founded SST Electronics with the help of his dad and produced antenna tuners for the amateur market. I have seen conflicting stories about SST standing for Solid State Tuners vs Solid State Transmitters. Here's a 1970s ad for SST.



I managed to find a T-2 Ultra Tuner and I have to say, it is compact and seems well constructed.



The unit has a very neatly wound toroid, and two high quality variable caps. The ads claim 200W power handling. I've yet to try mine but the previous ham must have used and loved it – his call and SSN are engraved underneath.

Apparently, Greg eventually lost interest in ham radio. A BARS member with callbooks from the 1970s may be able to find out when WB6ZNM lapsed. An interesting fact is that after forming Black Flag, he also formed SST Records, which published their albums as well as other punk bands' work. The label even retains the SST logo. From blogs I have seen, the SST radio gear has a collectible value as a crossover as well — punk fans want these tuners and they can drive up ebay prices. I do have one Black Flag CD and it is ...well, punky.

The takeaway here is something we heard from our mothers: DON'T JUDGE A BOOK BY ITS COVER. You never know when the next ham you meet could have a hidden passion for the hobby or technical knowledge that could make a lot of other people happy. Or three chords and the truth.

Feature Article: Reporting on the Nashua Vintage Radio Show

Those of you with an interest in vintage electronics should be enthused that we have a big club in the area. www.nearc.net is the

website of the New England Vintage Electronics club. You may have seen the BARS email post from N1HTS about the show which happened on Sunday, March 1st. I got in touch with Jim and he was gracious enough to let me put gear in his van to go set up there as a dealer for a change. This was extremely helpful as I had some heavy items to bring. Jim was planning to set up with a big batch of 78 RPM records he had procured.





The show was held at the Courtyard Marriott in Nashua. This is the new venue for the meet which for many years was held at the Westford Regency and has been one of the biggest antique radio shows in the area. The focus is still antique radios but you can also find ham gear, antique TVs and record players, test equipment, and books. Radios from early 1920s balloon-tube sets, crystal receivers, A/C sets, and transistor radios abound. Some items are very pricey and if you can't afford a \$950 catalin (swirly bakelite plastic) radio or a Philco Predicta TV you can at least browse around and take photos for free.

I had a generously loaded table and was very happy to see the hotel's furniture supported the 100 lb WWII receiver I had brought – a very clean Hallicrafters SX-28 general coverage

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radio. I also had various small tube and transistor sets in working and nonworking shape, and even a Waterman Pocketscope oscilloscope probably from the 1940s, working!

Believe it or not, the SX-28 was one of the first items sold. I had brought it to Near-Fest a couple of years ago and had a pretty firm price on it. It was complete, and had not been abused – but had not been restored to working condition either. That being said, I did not want to give it away too cheaply. Thousands were made around WWII but how many have survived without being modified by well meaning people with power drills? So I was pleased when a younger man stopped by to ask about the set. It turns out he was an SWL but not a ham but knew what the radio was and how important it was for the War. I did tell him it was not working and repairs like recapping in the RF area would be difficult and not for a beginner. In the end he offered me a low price, and I countered with a number that was higher but reasonable and we shook hands. He said he had other vintage receivers and was going to enlist an experienced friend to make the SX-28 live again. I couldn't have been happier to see it get a good home. The man and his friend muscled it away. Google "SX-28" and you will find many websites and YouTube videos about the receiver.

Jim did sell some of his 78s, which were all classical – especially ones which were sets like Tchaikovsky's *The Nutcracker*. I was flexible on my prices, especially the nonworking sets. So I went home with only one small item I had brought!

Jim and I enjoyed socializing behind our tables, too, and we gave each other breaks to walk around and purchase things. Since I was downsizing, I tried not to be tempted by too much. That day I seemed to find a lot of books – the ARRL VHF Manual for a friend, and some theory books for myself. I got a super looking 5-volume set of Basic Electronics by Rider publications. These show tube theory circuits in easy-to-digest chunks including oscilloscope diagrams.

At the end of the show I picked up what I was told was a National vacuum-tube voltmeter for \$5. I have never seen a device like this from National (the National Company, of Malden MA, which made receivers, transceivers, and electronic parts) and cannot find it in any National catalogs online. The black cabinet is similar to the National SW-3 style receivers of the 1930s and National/Millen may have produced this or at least the parts. The engraved knobs tell me it is not homebrew, certainly.



Inside are three octal tubes and a beefy transformer. I had intended to use this as a power supply, or build a regenerative radio inside – now I am wondering if I should restore it and do an article for Electric Radio (www.ermag.com)? Can anyone identify this?
