From the Editor's Desk

Think the peak of solar cycle 25 has been achieved? Maybe not. While the general consensus is that the peak occurred in July, observations show that the sunspot distribution between the northern hemisphere and the southern hemisphere of the sun is asymmetrical, causing a few solar scientists to wonder if this cycle still has a surprise left for us.

In the usual sunspot cycle, the earliest sunspots appear at high latitudes in both the northern and southern hemispheres. As the sunspot cycle progresses, the sunspots appear closer to the sun's equator and are symmetrically distributed with respect to their latitude. That's not the case with Cycle 25. The sunspots in the southern hemisphere are further from the sun's equator (on average) than the sunspots in the northern hemisphere.

While predictions of sunspot activity are always "your mileage may vary", the thinking in some quarters is that we will either get a second peak or the peak will be broader than it typically is.

Anyway, we are still getting geomagnetic storms and flares. Monitor the space weather sites and expect the unexpected when it comes to both propagation blackouts and surprise VHF openings. So Get On The Air and see what's possible.

We had another successful field day this year even with a last-minute change of venue and a new choice of food for the weekend. Thankfully Nan Araway, NK1A, generously volunteered to host the event at her home so we could all enjoy field day. Doug, N1WRN, arranged for the food from 'What the Fork' so we could all be well fed and energized to make contacts during the day.



Friday night we had a good-sized group of volunteers to help scout out and place the antennas so we would be ready to operate at 2:00 on Saturday.



The dipoles were placed using a drone this year which worked out really well, with a minimum of problems getting ropes in the trees. This was a method I had not seen before so it was great to see a new way of hoisting antennas, Thanks go to Dwight Doane, KC1WXT, for the use and skilled operation of his drone.



Saturday operation started on time, and we began to make contacts after a slow start.



We ran full-time on emergency power using a generator supplied by Peter Norden, N1ALO, so we could receive an extra 100 points.






Slowly but surely, the map of states began to be populated with new contacts as everyone had a chance to get on the air and operate.



The porch area was a cozy spot to sit and make new friends from people within the group who had never met in person before. We shut down operations around 9:00 and began again early Sunday morning.



In all we had over 30 people attend the event and the weather turned out well with no rain this year. We earned 562 points from QSO's and 880 from bonus activities for a total of 1,442 points! Many of these were from FT8, CW, and SSB, so many different modes contributed to the total score.



The activity ended promptly at 2:00 and the antenna take-down crew began bringing down the dipoles and tower to be stored away under Nan's barn for next year. The Billerica EOC had

asked for all the BARS equipment to be removed so we needed a new place to store the tower and tribander.



The weekend ended with many good memories and the satisfaction of a job well done by all. I want to thank everyone for participating and making this year's field day another success. It wouldn't have happened without the help of all involved.

Technician In A Day Class

At the 2025 Northeast HamXposition and New England Division Convention, Sponsored by the Cape Ann Amateur Radio Association

Our Technician In A Day Session is a study course. The course allows you to become licensed by the Federal Communications Commission as an Amateur Radio Operator.

You should obtain a copy of the ARRL Technician Class License Manual. You may purchase this book at Ham Radio Outlet or any other amateur radio related store.

You should read the book. The information contained therein will allow you to answer questions on a 35-question test for obtaining your Technician License.

There are videos on Youtube.com at W4EEY that explain the theory and cover the questions to enhance your knowledge. You may also take practice exams at https://hamstudy.org for comprehension.

TECH IN A DAY CLASSROOM (HUDSON) — SESSION – SATURDAY, AUGUST 23, 2025 8:00 AM TO 5:00 PM

- 1. You should apply and obtain a FCC Registration Number at: https://apps.fcc.gov/coresWeb/publicHome.do
- 2. You will be charged a slight fee for this course. \$40.00. For Adults and Teenagers 18+ (Normally, \$15.00* for the Examination \$15.00 for study materials and \$10.00 for snacks and drinks which will be provided for the session.) *Minors under 18 years Test Fee is \$5.00 -- Course cost: (\$30.00)
- 3. The Tech In A Day Session will be almost a full day session (8 AM to 5 PM)

Registration begins 8:00am - 8:50 am.

- a. The first Study Session begins at 9:00 AM for 45 minutes and you will be given a 15-minute break before the next session begins at 10 AM.
- b. Three study sessions will be held before a lunch break (approximately 11:45 AM-1:00 PM)
- c. There will be three more study sessions in the afternoon to run to 3:45 PM.
- d. Testing will begin approximately at 4:00 PM.

You will be administered an examination of 35 questions of which you must score at least 26 out of 35 or better to PASS.

Upon completion of your successful examination, you will be handed a Certificate of Successful Completion of Examination (CSCE Form).

Your Exam results will be forwarded to the ARRL VEC in Newington, CT for processing to the Federal Communications Commission. When your license has been processed, you will receive an email from the FCC requesting the \$35.00 Application Fee.

Upon receipt of your payment, you will receive an email with instructions on how to download a copy of your new license.

Becoming an ARRL member or is your membership up for renewal?

One of the benefits of being an ARRL Affiliated Club is a commission for recruiting new ARRL members and securing timely ARRL member renewals.

Each new ARRL member earns the club a \$15.00 commission. New members are defined as never having been a member or a returning member that has not been a member for two years. Each renewal earns the club a \$5.00 commission. There is no limit to the amount a club can earn in this program.

Multiyear memberships earn only one commission. Life, Family, International, Blind, and Student memberships are not eligible for a commission. The member will not be eligible to receive a gift or incentive if the club collects a commission on the membership.

At least 82 BARS members are also ARRL members. If we all renewed through the club, we could potentially receive \$410 per year from the ARRL.

In this time of social distancing, we have been using Zoom for our monthly club meetings. I have been thinking that Elmers could also be using Zoom to coach new hams instead of actually



Is your Email address on the FCC site up to date? § 97.23 Mailing and email addresses.

Each license grant must show the grantee's correct name, mailing address, and email address. The email address must be an address where the grantee can receive electronic correspondence. Revocation of the station license or suspension of the operator license may result when correspondence from the FCC is returned as undeliverable because the grantee failed to provide the correct email address.

[85 FR 85533, Dec. 29, 2020]

I recommend that you log on to the "your FCC Registration" at https://apps.fcc.gov/coresWeb/updateRegistrationPre.do to make sure that your email address is up to date. Also, in the future should you change your home address, or your email address be sure to remember to update it on the FCC site.

[The \$35 FCC application fee applies to new, renewal, rule waiver, and modification applications that request a new vanity call sign. The fee will be per application.

Administrative updates, such as a change of name, mailing or email address, and modification applications to upgrade an amateur radio licensee's operator class or to request a sequentially issued call sign, are exempt from fees. – ed.]

I recommend it because the software used to generate practice exams on HamStudy.org is the same software that is used to create exams for online tests. By doing that when you take an online upgrade exam the test question format will be familiar. With HamStudy.org practice tests you should use the keyboard to select the answer, A, B, C, or D and not your mouse as that is the way online exams are run.





July Get-on-the-Air Suggestions

KA1GTT Andy Wallace here. I am offering my input for this month's Get on the Air column. These are contests which can be

on HF or VHF/UHF, and may be SSB (voice), CW (Morse code) or digital (FT8 etc) modes. If you are a beginner, contests can still be a lot of fun. Most of the time the rules expect you to submit electronic logs of your activity, but I know hams who simply want to exchange QSLs for confirmation.

Contests can be frantic - rapid exchanges (what info the stations pass back and forth) and careful rules of engagement. But others are more casual. It always helps to tune in stations and listen to the exchange, and get a feel for the methods.

One of the best resources for finding out what contests are upcoming is the WA7BNM website and his 8 day contest calendar at:

https://www.contestcalendar.com/weeklycont.php

This gives a snapshot of the next 8 days and you can instantly see what contests are longer term (like across weekends) and thus more popular.

The 12-month calendar is excellent for getitng a snapshot of an entire month in advance. Surprisingly, I find it has more contests listed than the "Perpetual" site view. The 12 month is what I used to compile this month's hot contests.

Of note: contests are listed in UTC (Coordinated Universal Time or Greenwich Mean Time or Zulu) day and date. This is the time going through the 0 degree meridian (Greenwich, U.K.). If you are new to hamming you need to know hams historically use UTC to align with hams around the world in a way that being on the air at a certain time is simple. We're in Eastern Daylight Time right now, so that means UTC is 4 hours ahead of us. 0000Z being midnight Zulu/UTC/GMT translates to 8:00 PM EDT. So taking for example the 10-10 contest below, the start of the contest is 00:01UTC May 3 (Saturday). Subtract four hours and you better have your rig ready at 8:01PM EDT Friday evening. Get it? And for Eastern Standard Time we'd be 5 hours behind.

Before we get to this month's list of contests, an admission:

MAJOR EGG ON MY FACE / HUMBLE APOLOGY / DROPPED THE BALL!

I am SO sorry I did not research further last month and instead relied on WA7BNM's list only. I missed one of the best contests: 13 COLONIES!

See the website to see what you missed this year. ② It's a great contest involving stations from the original 13 colonies (states now), plus England and France.

To avoid repeating this mistake in the future, I really should resubscribe to the ARRL Contest Calendar to get a wider range of events. For instance:

More information about RTTY for those not familiar with it: RTTY stands for Radioteletype. RTTY is one of the original "digital modes." In the dark ages, it required hooking a RTTY converter (demodulator) to a receiver and connecting that to a large, oily, loud mechanical teletypewriter. Take a look at this video to see what this involved:

Marla built a computer in the 1970s where the interface was a mechanical teletype [KSR-15]. BARS member Jesse Creamer, W1DEA (SK), enjoyed RTTY a lot and was published in RTTY journals.

RTTY is a conversational mode. If you enjoy FT8 you must also know the exchange is predefined and short. On RTTY you can talk more! And since technology has marched on, running RTTY nowadays is as simple as hooking a USB cable between your computer and transceiver.

If nothing else, this contest is a good time to set up your RTTY software and make sure it's working. I use an iPhone and one interesting app I have installed is Black Cat Systems' NAVTEX PAD. This uses the iPhone mic to decode RTTY audio playing from the speaker of your HF receiver. It can work well. This sort of thing can allow you to eavesdrop on RTTY and decide whether to make the jump to try it on transmit. See:
