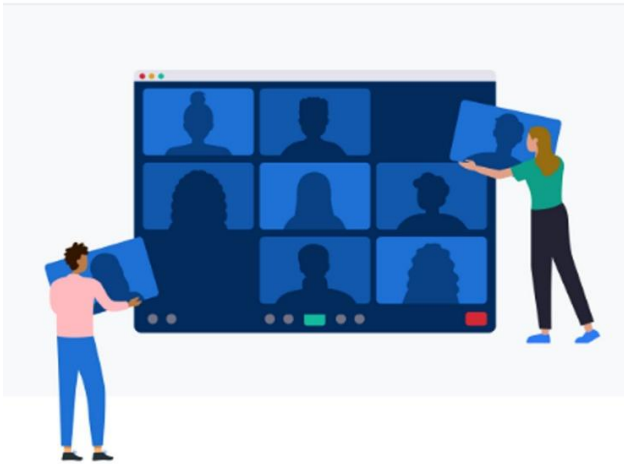

From the Editor’s Desk By Marla Wallace, WA1GSF

I just realized that I’ve been a ham for sixty years. I got my ticket at about the same time I graduated from high school. Back then, you had to pass a code exam at five words a minute

in order to obtain the lowest-class license: the Novice, which gave you CW privileges on a small portion of 80, 40, 15 and 10 meters at reduced power and using crystal control. Furthermore, the license was only good for a year and was not renewable. This was the entry-level license back in the day. The theory was that you would polish your operating skills, improve your code speed and learn more about radio while getting on the air and then within the year you’d take the exam for a higher class of license.

The next tier came in two flavors: Technician and General. Both licenses were good for five years and renewable. They required passing the same theory module, but the code requirement for the Tech was five words per minute whereas the General required thirteen. And both licenses allowed you to operate phone, use a VFO, and run full power. The difference was that the Tech privileges restricted operation to the bands from 50 MHz and up, whereas the General gave you the same privileges but on all the HF bands of the time (160, 80, 40, 20, 15, and 10 meters) as well. Since I was heading off to college, I opted for the renewable Tech license.

This bifurcated privilege scheme had the unfortunate effect of “dead ending” the Technician licensees. Having HF privileges was insufficient incentive to get the CW speed up to thirteen WPM, for me at least. So I was stuck on the VHF and UHF bands where almost nobody used CW. I operated phone exclusively but learned a lot about radio technology of the era.

The VHF gear of the time was usually either repurposed commercial service (i.e.: taxicab or police band) radios or was home-brew. Before FM and repeaters came in, there were almost no companies making ham gear for those bands. (My own station – on 6 meters – used a taxicab radio as the transmitter and a home-brew receiver.) I used that station for about a decade and managed to work seventeen states, thanks to a good solar maximum and a great QTH. But I didn’t upgrade my license (to Extra) until the FCC dropped the code requirement in the 1990s.

I got into 2 meter FM repeaters when the Honeywell Radio Club (W1DC) took on the project of constructing a repeater. I designed and constructed the control logic for the machine, originally WR1ABP, which was located on the 300 Concord Rd. Honeywell building. By then, a few companies were making gear for 2 meter FM and the popularity of the mode surged.

But at about the same time, hobby computing went from a few lunatics making computational devices in their basements to companies offering “home computers” and it seemed like everybody was learning to write code in BASIC. I got distracted from ham radio throughout the rest of the century. After around 1980, I was virtually a silent key, though I still had a station for most of that time – sitting gathering dust,

I’m still more likely to be found pounding a keyboard and hooking up a microcontroller, but I’ve started to become

interested in getting on the air again. You might occasionally hear me on the air now, but I still feel more comfortable on VHF, even though I have HF capability. I'm trying to get into the habit of checking into the BARS net, so look for me there.

This is a GREAT event for a first-time public service event participant. It's a very laid back and calm event. It's always fun to watch a parade!

USA 250 Semiquincentennial Special Operating Event

Dear Massachusetts Hams,

I am reaching out to you, would like to be part of the 2026 ARRL Celebration of the USA 250 Semiquincentennial Special Operating Event. This is part of the Year of the Club and the 100th Anniversary of the ARRL Field Organization along with a year-long Worked All States (WAS-250).

I am the state manager for Massachusetts.

For one week in August 2026, there is the ability for stations located in Massachusetts to operate as W1AW/1. ARRL membership is not required. The dates are August 12-21.

August 14th & 15th will be an SSB operation from the New England HamXposition in Marlboro. They will have precedence in choosing the band and mode (probably SSB) for a block of time. We are looking for ops that can get on multiple

times during this week, from your club, home, mobile or portable stations and work stations that will be hunting you. Your transmitter MUST be in Massachusetts.

Modes that can be operated are:

- SSB
- CW
- Digital
- Satellite

ALL Logging MUST be done with computer logging that can export in ADIF format. The log will be sent to me once your operating has completed.

All volunteers will need to work together and share operating times with the team of ops. There will be an operation guide emailed a few weeks before the operating week to all volunteers.

Making ZOOM available to Elmers

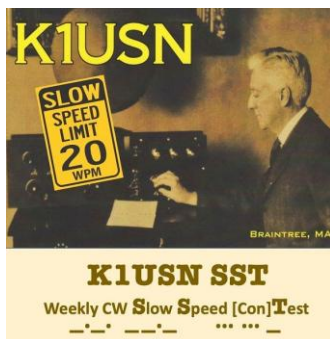

April Get-on-the-Air Suggestions from Andy Wallace, KA1GTT

KA1GTT Andy Wallace here. I am offering my input for this month's Get on the Air column. These are contests which can be on HF or VHF/UHF, and may be SSB (voice), CW (Morse code) or digital (FT8, etc.) modes. If you are a beginner, contests can still be a lot of fun. Most of the time the rules expect you to submit electronic logs of your activity, but I know hams who simply want to exchange QSLs for confirmation.

Contests can be frantic - rapid exchanges (what info the stations pass back and forth) and careful rules of engagement. But others are more casual. It always helps to tune in stations and listen to the exchange and get a feel for the methods.

One of the best resources for finding out what contests are upcoming is the WA7BNM website and his 8-day contest calendar at:

<https://www.contestcalendar.com/weeklycont.php>

This gives a snapshot of the next 8 days, and you can instantly see what contests are longer term (like across weekends) and thus more popular.

The 12-month calendar is excellent for getting a snapshot of an entire month in advance. Surprisingly, I find it has more contests listed than the "Perpetual" site view. The 12 month is what I used to compile this month's hot contests:

Of note: contests are listed in UTC (Coordinated Universal Time or Greenwich Mean Time or Zulu) day and date. This is the time going through the 0° meridian (Greenwich, U.K.). If you are new to ham radio, you need to know hams historically use UTC to align with hams around the world in a way that being on the air at a certain time is simple. We're in Eastern Daylight Time right now, so that means UTC is 4 hours ahead of us. 0000Z being midnight Zulu/UTC/GMT translates to 8:00 PM EST. So, for a typical contest, the start of the contest is 00:01UTC November 7 (Saturday). Subtract five hours and you better have your rig ready at 8:01PM EST Friday evening.

Comments: this is a CW (Morse code) contest, and usually a big one. The exchange is very simple which makes it great for a CW beginner. RST, which stands for Readability (1-5), Strength (1-5) and Tone (1-9). Tone is amusing because it is a throwback to when rigs were made by hams in the basement, may have had poor power supplies, and could have had hum or chirp on what should be a pure CW note. But – RST exchanges in contests are usually simplified. When you're trying to get as many countries as you can, you probably don't care if someone hears you like a local or just barely. So the tradition is, simply say 599 to all contacts! Serial number is simply the sequence of contacts you have made starting at 001 of course. If you know CW at any speed, get on for this one!

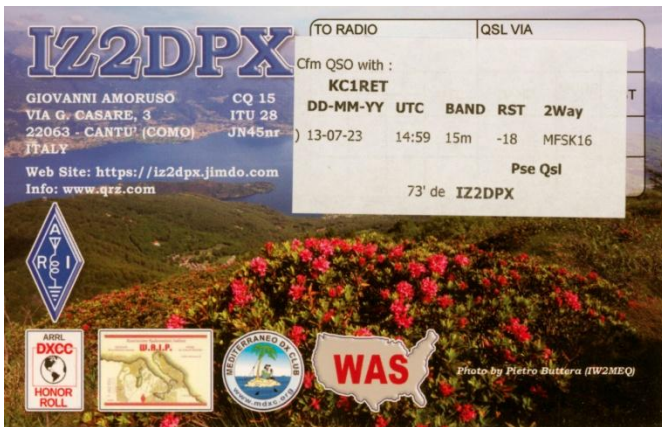
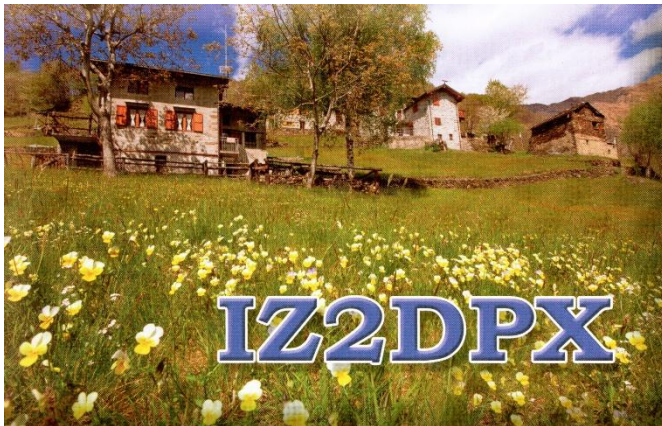
